

## **Notes**

The chord diagrams show the neck as you would be looking down on it while playing.

The thick fret at the left is the "nut" where the strings ride over.

The small dots on the diagram at the 5<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 10<sup>th</sup> positions are the fret markers that are on most of your fretboards. Use them to help you determine barre positions (ie: on the 5<sup>th</sup> fret, 6<sup>th</sup> fret, etc.).

The solid barre is you index finger spread across all four strings.

Barre chords use certain chord shapes. These chord shapes are the position of the fingers on the strings. You'll notice studying the diagrams that certain shapes are repeated at different fret postions and yield different chords.

In some cases (not all) barre chords are easier to play. They give you the opportunity to play with higher or lower pitches of the same chord to give the song interest.

In this song (and in Honolulu City Lights as well) I've selected barre chords that utilize the the same or similar chord shapes. They are also selected to minimize movement of fingers both between chords and between frets on the fretboard.

You can play both of these songs in 1<sup>st</sup> postion (no barring). You can also experiment with using different positions for the same chord in the songs. Copy and paste the chords in on top of each other and study the movements of your fingers between the chords.

Note that in "Dock of the Bay" when going from Bb to A, just let your index finger slide over and above the nut.
